On Tuesday, Jan. 18, Microdyne Plastics Inc. in Colton unveiled to the public the largest solar installation in Colton history.

The renovations are designed to reduce energy costs.

Microdyne Plastics, which was founded in 1975 by Ron Brown and

been in Colton since 2007, specializes in precision parts for medical devices, automotive equipment, opto-electronics and semi conductor components.

The new solar panels will ensure a stable power supply through the use of more than 2,600 solar panel units that combined could save the company 35% in their energy costs.

The 650 KW panel measures

70,000 square feet and was funded in part by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

"We are thankful for this partnership with Solar Max and the city of Colton for many reasons," said Tracy Kimberlin, marketing director for Microdyne. "One is in keeping jobs in this community, providing the goods and services to our

City manager makes major concessions

Would that all council meetings were as fast and productive as the Tuesday, Jan. 18 city of Colton council meeting was.

The meeting began with making appointments to various commissions including: John Anaya Sr. to the Code Enforcement Housing Advisory Appeals Board for District 2, Jay Kitchen to the Recreation and Parks Commissions for District 4, Christina Luna Delgado to the Historic Preservation Commission for District 4 and four CDBG Ad-Hoc committee Planning Commissioners, Gary Mitchell (Zamora), Richard Prieto, (Oliva), Frank Navarro (Bennett) and Tom Archuleta (Perez).

One of the most discussed items on the agenda however, was that of the city manager's contract agreement amendment.

Per City Attorney Dean Derleth, Foster has made the following salary and benefit concessions: a six percent salary reduction, a four percent PERS employee contribution for a total of eight percent, and he has waived his rights to an \$1,800 business equipment stipend, a \$2,500 tuition reim-

bursement and a discretionary bonus, which has no fixed dollar amount, for a total of 11.16% in concessions, effective immediately.

In total, Foster conceded close to 19% of his salary and benefits.

After Derleth's comments, Councilman David Toro, who was a member of the committee who hired Foster, thanked Foster for his willingness and leadership.

Dr. GnanaDev donates to burn center



ARMC Medical Director Dr. Dev GnanaDev recently made a \$6,500 donation to the Edward G. Hirschman Burn Center that has been used to purchase rehabilitation equipment for children and adults recovering from burn injuries.

Also purchased with the donation was a laptop computer, which can be used for school work by children hospitalized for prolonged periods.

The only burn center serving the four counties of San Bernardino, Riverside, Inyo and Mono, ARMC's Hirschman Burn Center treats approximately 500 inpatients annually and hundreds more on an outpatient basis. About a third of the Burn Center patients are children.

The equipment is being used to create a rehabilitation area that will be housed in the Hirschman Burn Center, which is located on the

Businesses utilizing SBVEZ incentives nearly double in 2010



The San Bernardino Valley Enterprise Zone (SBVEZ) announced today that the number of businesses that filed for its tax credits significantly increased in 2010. Each year the zone helps more local employers save thousands of dollars, allowing them to cope with today's difficult economy. The hiring tax credit is the most commonly used incentive, which rewards employers for providing jobs to local workers who face significant barriers to employment.

The SBVEZ experienced a 46 percent increase in the number of businesses that filed hiring tax credit vouchers from 2009. A total of 2,276 approved vouchers were filed by 182 businesses last year. These vouchers are estimated to produce a total of \$71 million in tax savings for these businesses during the five-year period they can claim the credit for a single employee.

Reports showed that the cost savings contributed to the creation of

customers and most of all, for future opportunity. We keep hope alive."

After the formal presentation of the unveiling, guests were invited to tour the facility as well as ascend on a scissor lift to the top of the building to view the panels.

The facility has 90,000 square

feet of manufacturing space and high tech machines and skilled human hands crank out all manner of plastic products from the tiniest parts to large water bottles and more.

A ride up the scissor lift revealed not only panoramic views of the mountains and freeways, but the main attraction of the day, the

2,600 solar panels.

"At first, we didn't think we could do it," said Judy Lopez, chief financial officer for Microdyne. "But Solar Max bent their backs for us. It was a win win for everyone. Solar Max was great to work with."

Colton Mayor David Zamora also had good things to say about the company and his own city staff.

"I'm very encouraged that this business is in the city of Colton," he said. "They are one of their biggest employers. I would like to think that other businesses could benefit from them being in our city."

Zamora added that in chatting with Microdyne and Solar Max staff, he learned that city of Colton staff was very responsive and took care of business in the permitting process.

"It's a positive step for Colton," he said.

"The system at Microdyne is projected to deliver in volumes similar to the energy of what more than 500 homes might use," said Gerald Katz, senior energy service specialist for Colton. "We will give them incentives based on the energy actually produced."

"Happy New Year on behalf of Chairwoman Josie Gonzales," Vasquez said, emphasizing the supervisor's new title, which brought rounds of applause from the audience.

Councilmember Frank Gonzales

asked Vasquez to relay a congratulatory message to the supervisor, adding not to worry about those who did not support her chairmanship and that Colton does support her.

Residential burglary investigation/arrest

Officers responded to a residential burglary investigation at a residence located in the apartment complex at 1401 E. Santo Antonio Dr. at 11 p.m. on Monday, Jan. 17.

Officers found the apartment had been broken into earlier in the evening. Electronics, various household items, and car keys were stolen. Suspect(s) used the keys to steal the victim's 2008 Dodge Neon which had been parked in the complex parking lot.

Investigation led officers to search an apartment in the same complex, which resulted in the discovery of a small amount of the stolen property.. Officers developed additional information which led them to believe occupants of another apartment in the complex were possibly involved in the crime. Using a K-9 doing an evidence search, officers were led from the victim's apartment to an apartment occupied by suspect Jose Lopez, 23.

A search of Lopez's apartment led to the recovery of numerous items stolen in the burglary and the arrest of Lopez. On Monday, Jan. 17, the Inland Empire Concerned African American Churches (IECAAC) hosted the 31st Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Breakfast in honor of Dr. King's life and legacy.

This year's breakfast was held at the Inghram Community Center and the theme was "Dream the Plan."

The mission of the IECAAC is "to address the needs of the African American communities of the Inland Empire, and then to lead changes to improve life within our communities."

Besides bringing the community together in fellowship and unity, the breakfast is also a time to encourage others to live the vision of Dr. King and to honor individuals

who in one way or another have exemplified the values that he lived and taught.

The Gertrude Whetzel Visionary Award recipient was Terrance Stone, CEO of Young Visionaries Youth Leadership Academy.

The award is named after Gertrude Whetzel who was instrumental in making the statue of Dr. King in front of San Bernardino City Hall a reality in the 1970s. She was a part of the committee who raised the funds and helped keep efforts going.

The Trail Blazer Award, in honor of Dorothy Inghram, 105, was presented to Jennifer Vaughn-Blakely, CEO of Sundance Consultant Services.

This award recognizes those who have helped open doors for others, much the same way Mrs. Inghram, an educator, has done most of her

life. Throughout her distinguished life, Inghram was many "firsts" in the field of education, including one of the first students at San Bernardino Valley College.

The Public Service Award went to San Bernardino Police Chief Keith Kilmer.

The Patriot Award Went to James Ramos, Chairman of the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians for exemplifying the American Dream and encouraging others to go after that dream.

The Beyond Boundaries Award recipient was Linda Jackson of NID, National Association of Real Estate Brokers, Investment Division Housing Counseling Agency, an organization that assists families with home foreclosures. This award recognizes individuals who "think outside the box" and come up with innovative ways of solving complex issues.

The Community Service Award is usually reserved for one individual but this year, there were two recipients; Clyde Williams, outreach and recruitment coordinator at San Bernardino Valley College and Marco Cota, dean of counseling and matriculation at San Bernardino Valley College.

"These are the people doing things in our community," said Pastor Raymond Turner of IECAAC. "Our focus is to move beyond remembering Dr. King's dream and put a plan in place. We want to focus on youth and a renewed commitment to put a plan into action."

500 pairs of feet washed, outfitted with new shoes

What better way to spend a day off than with a day on; 80 local community members volunteered a good portion of their afternoon on Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service to wash the feet of hundreds of children and outfit each with a brand new pair of shoes through global humanitarian aid organization Samaritan's Feet.

According to Samaritan's Feet West Coast Coordinator Alton Green, the event that was held at the Boys and Girls Club of San Bernardino in Delmann Heights on

Monday was the West Coast's inaugural Martin Luther King National Day of Service in the Inland Empire. The event was open to children of the local community and beyond; 500 showed up to get their feet pampered, hear an inspirational message, and walk away with a new pair of shoes.

"We wanted to honor Dr. Martin Luther King as a servant and to emulate his service, to keep that fire burning to serve the community, and what a better day and way to serve than on Martin Luther King Day," Green said.

The local event was part of the organization's National Day of

Service that involved over 2,000 volunteers and took place in 12 cities across the country in an effort to commemorate the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

"It is our goal to help communities reach deeper into their neighborhoods by; demonstrating this act of servant-leadership and humility, provide for a basic need, and to share a message of hope to those in need," said Manny Ohonme, founder and CEO of Samaritan's Feet. "Each year the Corporation for National and Community Service honors the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. by asking Americans to serve

others and on January 17th over 2,000 volunteers will do so in a very profound way".

Samaritan's Feet San Bernardino partnered with the Boys and Girls Club of San Bernardino. "It was a wonderful opportunity to serve in honor of Dr. King's legacy," said A. Majadi, president and CEO of BGCSB.

According to Samaritan's Feet there are an estimated 300 million children who go without shoes every day and more than 1 million that die each year from foot borne disease. The organization's goal is to provide 10 million pairs of shoes for 10 million impoverished children in the next 10 years, and since 2003 Samaritan's Feet and its team of 70,000 ambassadors

have assisted nearly 3 million children in over 40 nations.

Green said that he has delivered shoes to impoverished children in San Bernardino who stay home from school because they have no shoes.

"Shoes become the vehicle of transportation," Green said about the importance of shoes. "It's a safety issue, [shoes] prevent against disease, cuts - it's very important to us."

Since Samaritan's Feet set up the Inland Empire facility in San Bernardino three years ago, it has already distributed over 80,000 shoes to those in need.

Healthcare reform and pre-existing conditions

The plight of people who lose their insurance and then get sick is one of the most appealing arguments for health care reform. And the White House really took advantage of it, soliciting tear-jerking stories from responsible folks who played by the rules and who can't get insurance through no fault of their own.

The disagreeable truth—a relentless law of economics—is that you can't insure a pre-existing. If you wreck your car, State Farm pays only if you had the insurance policy before the accident. If you don't have insurance, your options are to take the bus, walk, ride a bicycle, get help from friends or family, or come up with money to buy a new car from some source other than a car insurance company.

People would very much like the "right" to buy insurance that would cover their pre-existing, without restrictions or waiting periods. But the same folks don't much like the idea of paying for other people's pre-existing—or even for their sicknesses. So the healthy ones often switch into a new policy that gives them an enticing low rate if they pass the underwriting. Then those who can't switch see their premiums go up rapidly. This is called the "death spiral." Is it the wicked insurance companies' fault? Or human nature?

You might naturally feel sympathy toward a person who finds out that he has a costly and fatal condition like AIDS. But what if he doesn't tell the life insurance company about the pre-existing as he buys a million-dollar policy for the benefit of his partner? Is it wicked of the insurer to rescind the policy because of fraud? Or should the government force the company to pay—until it goes bankrupt, and leaves all of its subscribers without coverage?

If you have insurance through

your employer, pre-existing are likely not a problem—if you can get the job, that is. But the huge drawback of employer-owned insurance is that you lose it if you lose your job. This is called "job lock." Lots of people are stuck in jobs they hate because of this.

It might not seem fair that people who pay into a policy for years or decades are left with nothing the instant the policy lapses. But that is the nature of an insurance contract.

If over 10 years or so, you put \$100,000 into a safe investment, at the end of that time you have \$100,000 plus interest. If instead you hand the money over to the insurance cartel, you have nothing. The trade-off is that if you have a catastrophic event during the time you are covered, the insurer pays. Most people think the deal is a fair one, and that's why they voluntarily pay the premiums.

As soon as the government forces people to pay a premium for other people's pre-existing, they are likely to object to what they—quite reasonably—see as a rip-off. Hence the need for more force: the individual mandate.

Some people don't see the connection, and think we can keep that popular provision on pre-existing, and delete the rest. We can't.

The long-term answer to the problem of pre-existing is to break the connection between health insurance and employment, which requires changing the tax code provision that caused it. People can pay medical costs with pre-tax dollars if and only if they pay with employer-owned insurance. If they pay out of pocket or through individual policies, they must use after-tax dollars. With payroll tax and income taxes, that means they pay about twice as much. How can that be fair?

People tend to have much longer relationships with groups other than their employer: churches, credit unions, or fraternal organizations, for example. Why can't they get group health insurance in that way? This type of group policy could offer advantageous guaranteed renewability to keep healthy people in the program.

And why should people get a huge tax advantage if and only if they funnel payments through a third party?

Meanwhile, there are people who have problems now. And there is a solution that already works, without the system-wide destruction of ObamaCare. Many states have high-risk pools for the uninsurable. In Colorado, the monthly premium for a 35-year-old man with income under \$50,000 is about \$204, around \$50 higher than premiums in the regular market. In New Jersey, with guaranteed issue/community rating like that in ObamaCare, the regular monthly premium is \$2,150.

Forcing insurers to cover pre-existing without allowing enormous premium increases will bankrupt them. Perhaps driving private insurers out of business is the real agenda. However, imposing a "solution" that multiplies costs bankrupts everybody.

Those who are counting on that single payer hovering in the background need to remember that the government is already bankrupt—a very dangerous pre-existing condition.

The most popular provision of ObamaCare may also be the worst. The whole Act needs to be repealed.

Maintain ban on keeping ferrets as pets

California lawmakers should reject calls to overturn the state's

ban on keeping ferrets as pets. Just last week, a 4-month-old Missouri baby lost most of his fingers after the family's pet ferret ate them while the child was sleeping. A few years ago, a 5-week-old Ohio girl was bitten at least 50 times and needed 100 stitches.

Although breeders churn them out and market them as if they require little care, ferrets are highly energetic, active, and curious. They cannot be kept continuously caged. They are prone to biting if startled, excited, or handled improperly. Ferrets have their own distinct scent and may or may not be able to be litter-trained. Aggressive chewers and diggers,

many become victims of abandonment or neglect when their owners grow tired of replacing carpeting, sofa stuffing, shoes, or stereos that have been destroyed.

Shelters and rescue groups across the country have to cope with the aftermath when people surrender exotic animals they once "had to" have. Many are euthanized.

For the sake of the animals and for the well-being of their constituents, California legislators should keep the ban on ferrets in place.

The Martin Luther King Jr. holiday was an opportunity for some to relax on their day off. For others it was an opportunity to serve their community in the spirit of King's legacy.

The Arrowhead United Way's Youth Leadership council (YLC) led the effort to create a playground at the Salvation Army Hospitality House Emergency Family Shelter. The Salvation Army moved into the location about eight months ago but there was no place for the many children that

pass through there to play. The facility has 80 beds and welcomes families who are homeless in need of a place to stay. At its capacity last month 32 adults and 44 children were staying in the shelter.

The only space was a piece of pavement.

When the YLC was looking for a community project to celebrate the holiday with they approached Captain Stephen Ball, commander of the Salvation Army, and asked if the playground would be a good idea.

"He was thrilled with the idea," said Knea Hawley, vice president of Resource Development, Arrow-

head United Way.

According to Ball, when the organization planned to move the shelter there they had to do extensive renovations.

"We just barely had enough money to renovate," said Ball.

Over 150 volunteers donated their day to making what looked more like a parking lot into a fun place for children to play.

"It was amazing to see that many people come together," said Hawley.

There were members of the YLC as well as volunteers from many other organizations. They included the employees of Kohl's and Target Distribution Centers, the San Bernardino City and Rialto Fire departments and students from Rialto High School.

"They came from every aspect of the community," she said.

The day began with an inspiring word from San Bernardino City Councilmember Virginia Vasquez about the work of King. Then volunteers got to work.

They painted a four-square court and a basketball court and installed basketball hoops.

They also created a play area for toddlers by constructing a playhouse and installing small slides. There are also new tether ball courts.

To brighten up the area, children friendly pictures were painted on the ground, flowers were planted and umbrellas were installed at the tables. Six new benches were also built to give people a place to sit outdoors.

"It was a great day," said Ball.

Initially the group only had \$50 for the project, but looked to other resources and received thousands in donations from Home Depot and Kohl's.

Teacher turned novelist brings readers into Madame Tussaud's French Revolution

The bestselling author Michelle Moran will soon be releasing her fourth book "Madame Tussaud: A Novel of the French Revolution."

Moran is an alumni of Pomona College and taught at Rialto High School for six years before her first book published in the United States, "Nefertiti," became a best-seller.

Following that success she went on to write two more books, "The Heretic Queen" and "Cleopatra's Daughter."

Now she is leaving the ancient world and diving into the world of the French Revolution.

"Madame Tussaud" is a book about the woman the world famous wax museums are named for. Her role during the revolution as a wax artist led to encounters with French aristocracy, Thomas Jefferson, Ben Franklin, and Marie Antoinette herself. The amazing story of the revolution is told through the eyes of Tussaud.

"It's extraordinary that she actually survived the revolution," said Moran.

bring it alive.

"I've never lost my passion for history," said Moran.

She first became interested in the story of Tussaud while visiting the original Madame Tussaud's Wax Museum in London. She saw Tus-

saud's wax sculptures of famous figures in the French aristocracy as well as sculptures of Tussaud walking through a graveyard filled with human heads.

"I thought her story must be extraordinary," said Moran.

And it was.

Creating wax sculptures in a prominent art district, Tussaud gained a reputation and was sought after by royalty and the wealthy. However when the revolution began any association with the upper class would send you to the guillotine. Her life was spared because she used her talents to create masks of the despised ruling class for revolutionaries to protest with. Her creations also displayed the fashions of the revolution that separated the upper class from the commoners. At the time a commoner dressing anything like an aristocrat could mean death at the hand of other commoners.

"I really hope they have a new understanding of the French Revolution," said Moran.

Moran said her next few books will also be set in France, a country she has grown to love.

"It makes for some rich writing," she said.

"Madame Tussaud" will be available on Feb. 15.

Moran will also speak at Madame Tussauds Wax Museum in West Hollywood in honor of Tussaud's 250th birthday on Feb. 15.

The Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, Jan. 11, selected Fifth District Supervisor Josie Gonzales to serve as board chair during the next two years and First District Supervisor Brad Mitzelfelt to serve as vice chairman.

"It's a new day," said Chair Josie Gonzales. "We are looking to the positive as my colleagues and I work with the county Chief Executive Officer to shape our vision, focusing on building strong, economically viable, healthy communities throughout San Bernardino County."

"I would like to thank my colleagues for selecting me as vice chairman," said Supervisor Mitzelfelt. "I pledge to work cooperatively with the chair in helping lead this organization as we deal with many painful budget decisions ahead, and, on a more positive note, as we pursue initiatives to improve County government and the quality of life for our residents."

Chair Gonzales was elected on a

3-2 vote with Mitzelfelt and Third District Supervisor Neil Derry in opposition. Vice Chairman Mitzelfelt was elected unanimously.

The voter-approved county charter states the chair serves as the board's general executive agent. The chair's duties include conducting meetings of the board,

signing agreements approved by the board, and acting on the board's behalf when the board is not immediately available.

The Board of Supervisors faces a number of challenges in the months and years ahead. The county is projecting a \$37.2 million shortfall for 2011-12 and \$135.2 million over the next five

years. On top of that, the county has yet to see how the state will cope with its ongoing shortfall. Sacramento has exhausted all of its options except for measures that will severely impact local government, and the state's outlook is worsening.

Nearly 80 percent of the county's \$135.2 million, five-year shortfall is due to contracted salary and the projected growth in the cost of retirement obligations. Retirement costs alone over the next five years are projected to increase by \$103.8 million annually.

Sound, affordable counseling in trying times

With foreclosures and short sales still plaguing the housing market, and the repercussions of a new and an extra lean state budget now on the table, the Community Counseling Center at Cal State San Bernardino is stressing the importance of keeping such threats in perspective.

The counseling center focuses on helping individuals from students to the general public in the Inland Empire, and it has begun taking appointments with the recent start of the winter quarter at CSUSB.

"The center typically counsels 100 to 200 clients each year," says Ed Teyber, a professor of psychology at CSUSB and the center's director. It offers long-term, low-cost counseling on a sliding

fee scale. The Community Counseling Center "never turns anyone away for financial hardship," says Teyber.

When it comes to counseling, Teyber says, people do the opposite of what you might expect them to do in trying times. "They're just trying to manage. They get kind of overwhelmed and so they just don't come to counseling."

The CSUSB Community Counseling Center offers quality confidential counseling services to individuals struggling with depression, anxiety, eating disorders, life changes and relationship problems, including marital issues. Counseling for children or those wishing to work on personal growth is offered as well.

Day and evening appointments are available, and the center also makes referrals. Many clients who desire longer-term counseling can be assisted throughout CSUSB's academic year, which continues into June.

Throughout its long history, the center has counseled with or referred more than 10,000 people who have sought its services. Single parents, coping with the complex challenges of balancing work and parenting make up its highest percentage of clients.

The Community Counseling Center is staffed by qualified CSUSB graduate students and supervised by Cal State San Bernardino faculty, who are licensed psychologists. Teyber has overseen the center since 1979.

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Reading Discoveries book discussion free at the County Museum

The San Bernardino County Museum is about to round out the second year of its monthly book discussion program, Reading Discoveries. Held every second Wednesday of the month at 7:30pm, this discussion is open to public free of charge.

Since its inception in 2009, the group has read about early fossil explorations, changing global weather patterns, evolution, how the domestication of plants and animals has influenced human societies, the science and social impacts of earthquakes, Latino history, the history and science of salt, the wisdom of crowds, and the glory days of citrus in the inland area.

"I started this program because I like to read and discuss books with other people," said Curator of Education Jolene Redvale, discussion facilitator for the program. "We read books in natural and cultural history that are relevant to understanding our place in the world. That gives us a really wide scope of titles we can enjoy."

Many participants feel the same way as Redvale. "We talk about many things in our discussions besides the book of the month. People's different backgrounds really add to the discussion," said Valerie

Mitchell, a teacher in San Bernardino. "Members of the group bring different perspectives to current ideas," described Drew Feldmann, of San Bernardino. "We also talk about other things besides the book," said participant Ed Reyes of Redlands. "Sometimes I come to the discussion even though I didn't read the book. Afterwards, I have felt like reading it and have enjoyed it." Teacher Mary Pettitt also enjoys the conversation with adults.

On February 9, two books have been selected; "Seashore Life of Southern California," New and Revised Edition by Sam Hinton, and "Under the Sea Wind" by Rachel L. Carson. Participants will plan to informally journey to the coast to observe tide pools in March.

"Many people ask, 'Do I have to read the book to be able to come?'" Redvale said. "Absolutely No! Everyone is welcome at the discussion. People have come without having read the book, and leave saying they will. Often, those who attend have a particular interest in the book's subject, and they only attend once or twice. It's nice to have people who bring lots of previous knowledge to the discussion, because it's one more way of learning more

about it. The discussions generally last two hours but we have stayed later a few times. Sometimes the conversation is so compelling, we just can't quit."

On March 9, the group will read and discuss "Ecology of Fear" by Mike Davis. He will also be at the museum for a book signing on Sunday, March 6 at 2pm, where visitors will get a chance to chat with him. "Ecology of Fear" will be available for sale at the Museum Store beginning of January, 2011.

The group will be inviting more authors to participate with presentations and book signings. "In 2009, we invited a number of authors whose work is represented in the book Inlandia, which we read over the summer. We had several authors attend each of the two discussions we had, and their input really enhanced the discussion," continued Redvale.

Beginning in 2011, the Museum Store will be stocking the books the group reads. Redvale plans to have a corner in the Museum Store with previous and upcoming titles, and a summary of the group's discussion. She hopes that this will help visitors' decision to participate in the discussion.

Participant Dale Mitchell agrees: "Come to the discussion, and pick

up the next month's book." Kim Clinton of Redlands added, "We all enjoy bouncing ideas off of each other. It's a group of people discussing things outside of work."

The group also enjoyed having Dr. David Hayes-Bautista participate in the discussion of his book, "La Nueva California," earlier this year. "As with most of our book titles, Dr. Hayes-Bautista's book drew many new participants to the program," Redvale said. "We feel that discussing the book with its author present provides unique opportunities to express our views and get questions answered."

Author Jeffrey Moussaieff Mason participated via e-mail from his home in New Zealand when the group discussed his book, "When Elephants Weep." "An e-mail discussion across the globe and multiple time zones was challenging at first, but we got the hang of it and had a great, rich discussion with him," said Redvale. "Mason expressed his appreciation of our perspectives on his work."

"I ask for input on the books we read," explained Redvale. "Sometimes I bring in a stack of books, and let the participants vote for the ones that sound compelling. I aim for a diverse range of topics and authors." Redvale makes the final choices and sends them to partici-

pants, as well as producing flyers to hand out to visitors.

Participants also enjoy reading in new topic areas. Many agree that they read books for the group they would never read otherwise. The conversations often draw in subjects from previous books, further enhancing the exploration of our world. Occasionally, participants don't favor a particular book, but that still didn't deter an enjoyable discussion.

Redvale has added a Friday afternoon discussion, beginning February 11 at 2pm. "This event is for those folks who are not available on the usual Wednesday evening, or who may not like to be out driving after dark. I want to make the program available to everyone. The Friday groups will initially meet every other month, and discuss the current and previous month's books," said Redvale.

The Reading Discoveries book discussion is on every second Wednesday of the month at 7:30pm, and on second Friday on even-numbered month at 2pm. This program is open to public free of charge.

Residents of Highland affected by the recent floods continue to clean up. Volunteers from the Southern Baptist Convention Disaster Relief Descended upon the Highland area to work hand-and-hand with residents. The Southern Baptist workers are being fed and housed at Emmanuel Baptist Church. Now four decades later, hundreds of Baptist disaster workers came to Highland.

Reuben and Isabelle Martinez, home owners in the disaster zone, found their home buried in mud. Both inside and outside the home was packed in mud that was left after the flood waters receded. The water line reached as high as four to five feet in areas of the home; while mud levels were about 3 feet.

Their insurance company refused to give any type of assessment of the home until the mud and debris is cleared enough to inspect the entire home. In the meantime, the job of cleaning up the debris fell upon the home owners.

Although as many as 100 volunteers have worked clearing the house, there are still tons of mud inside the home and about four to six feet of mud piled up in the back and front yards surrounding the resi-

dence. And this is just one of many homes in the area that were affected in the Village.

Joe Mujica, one of the residents of the Village who had his home "red tagged," said that the residents will be forming an emergency nonprofit organization for the community of the Village. This will make it

possible for donors to give directly to the victims and to take advantage of a tax deduction. A Board of Directors made up of the residents will be able to decide how the money will be dispersed.

The clean up will take several more weeks to months to complete.

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Sami Cardoza prepping to defend CIF-SS wrestling title

Colton High wrestling coach David Cardoza did not want his daughter signing up for wrestling, especially since it would be almost exclusively against boys. The protective father reluctantly approved and Samantha Cardoza has progressed to the point of winning the 2010 California Interscholastic Federation-Southern Section girls championship at the 108-pound division.

Since there are no high school girls programs, female wrestlers must develop their skills against boys. For girls who improve enough there are invitational tournaments.

"When Sami began wrestling at Pacific High as a freshman three years ago, she got pinned often. She does not get pinned anymore," said David Cardoza. In fact, Sami has been doing most of the pinning this season, with 14 of her 21 wins coming by pin against a mix of varsity and junior varsity boys competition. Her overall record this season is 21-7, much better than her 5-12 mark as a freshman.

"No. None of the boys ever make fun of me," said Sami Cardoza, who remained at Pacific High for her senior year. "Let's put it this way, I know how boys can be," countered David Cardoza.

To win her CIF-SS championship held at Northview High in Covina, the unseeded Cardoza had to work her way through 32 entrants at 108 pounds. She advanced by pinning the number-7 seed, the number-3,

and the number-2, finally reaching the title match after a decision in the semifinals. She captured the crown with a pin over state-ranked Kalin Knight-Alvarez of Ocean-side High. "I never expected her to win the title, maybe third place at best," said David Cardoza. "She injured her toe the day before the tournament. The toe locked out of place and we had to tape it back into joint or else it kept popping out. It still bothers her."

Sami Cardoza has a chance to make girls wrestling history if she can defend her CIF-SS crown this season because it will qualify her for the inaugural girls state championships next month in Bakersfield. This will also be the last year that high school girls wrestle against boys and girls. "Next year, everything will change. Girls will be sanctioned by the CIF and you have to wrestle either boys or girls, not both," said Sami.

David Cardoza admits that his daughter's record this season won't scare many opponents, yet at this point it's more of a process leading to an ultimate goal. "I'm not worried about her record right now. As long as she is placing and getting mat time. She just has to do what she has to do and then peak at the right time. Last year, Sami peaked at the right time." She recently took second at the Colton Tournament and fifth at South Hills. Three weeks ago, she won the junior varsity boys title at Colton in a 15-man bracket at 108 pounds.

"I wish I had a whole team like Samantha. She is a tough little competitor and very polite," said

Pacific High athletic director Carmel Brand. "She brings enthusiasm, excitement and is a good student. She is the top of the game in San Bernardino County." David Cardoza was the assistant coach at Pacific during Sami's freshman and sophomore years before taking over the head coaching job at his alma mater at Colton. Sami currently wrestles for Pacific coach Don Vedona, before that for Pacific coaches Ric Castro, and Fred and David Quinlan. "She is one of the top five girls in San Bernardino County," said Brand.

Those close to Sami say that she uses her legs and exceptional endurance to win most of her matches. She runs cross country at Pacific and has received some letters of interest from private colleges. "I want to wrestle in college and later try for the Olympic team." She does not want to attend a junior college and is willing to enroll out of state, where she would become a sports medicine major. Sami draws inspiration from former Pacific High All-CIF wrestler Andres Gomez-Perez, who nearly died twice during his four-year battle with leukemia. "Sami talks to him constantly and Andres motivates her," said David Cardoza.

Sami has also formed an informal support club with other top girl wrestlers of the Inland Empire including Riverside County CIF champions Amanda Hendrey, Marina Sanchez and section runnerup Cheyenne Youngblood. She lists her role models as former national champion Tatiana Padilla and

coached Sami, too. We will support Sami with anything she wants to do," said Cardoza. Sami's brother, Nick, was also a standout wrestler at Pacific.

"Sami has been around wrestling since she was in kindergarten and she is now in the middle of the evolution of girls wrestling," said David Cardoza. "I have coached many champions and Sami is a lot better than I ever thought. My wife (Suzie) and I have always taken her where she needed to go and did whatever we had to do. Suzie has

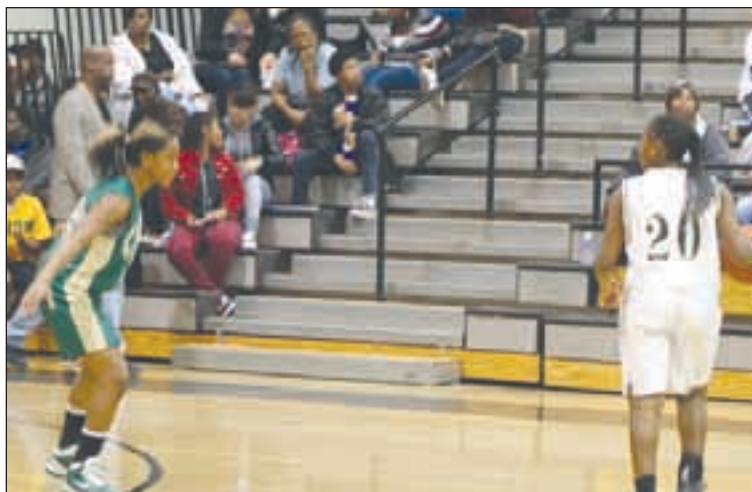

"I think it was the ugliest haircut I've ever seen."



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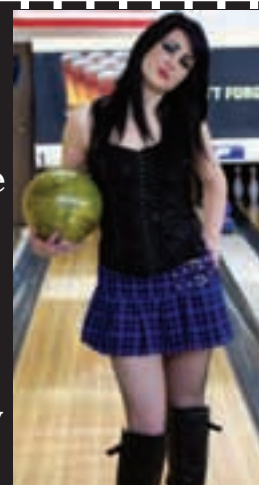

Born and raised in Romania, Elena learned to sew at a young

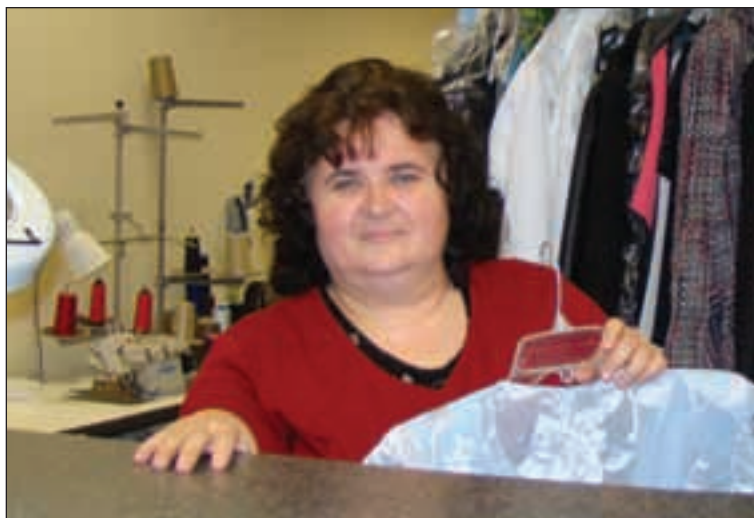
fully elegant chair coverings.
